**Travel Grant:** The InterExchange Foundation was established in 2006 to provide grants to young Americans who wish to help further cultural awareness through meaningful work abroad experiences. The grant award is intended to defray the costs of transportation, participation fees, travel insurance, housing, and meals related to a work, internship, or volunteer program.

Two types of grants are offered: the Working Abroad Grant and the Christianson Grant. Applicants for the Working Abroad Grant must already be accepted to an InterExchange Working Abroad program and can be awarded the program fee and up to \$2,000 towards airfare and other expenses. The deadline for application is eight weeks prior to the start date.

The Christianson Grant is open to applicants who have sought out and arranged their own programs. There are a number of awards for the Christianson Grant; two awards of \$12,000 for 12 plus months, two awards of \$5,000 for 6 plus months, and four awards of \$2,500 for 6 or more weeks. The deadline is March 15<sup>th</sup> for 2008 awards.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 28, U.S. citizens, and willing to submit a written report upon completion of the program.

### **Summer School in Cambridge:**

### **Study the Great Books in Rome:**

The Rome Institute of Liberal Arts is announcing their inaugural summer course in Rome entitled, "Beauty and the Sacred". The program is taught by two tutors at St. John's College, Annapolis. Mr. Pihas and Ms. Haigney will be assisted by art

historians who are Roman natives and also possess historical expertise.

The readings include Dante, *Divine Comedy*, Plato, *Symposium*, and Longinus, *On the Sublime*. The program is designed for undergraduates and will run from June 23<sup>rd</sup>-July 18<sup>th</sup>. The total estimated cost for the summer is \$4,380 which includes housing, tuition and insurance. The cost of the flight and personal expenses are not included.

RILA's interdisciplinary programs explore fundamental issues while reading great authors of the past and engaging great art. The inaugural course, for example, was designed to approach the relationship between the beautiful and the sacred from a variety of angles. Plato's *Symposium* is set alongside the proportions of classical art and architecture, Dante's *Divine Comedy* juxtaposed with Giotto's painting in Assisi, while Hegel and Walter Benjamin's writings on art and aesthetics are read alongside the works of Michelangelo, Caravaggio, and Bernini.

RILA's mission is not to teach Italian culture, but to explore questions that can be framed through a visit to Italy and Italian sources. Hence although courses often involve Italian authors, they also involve any authors or artists who make study in Italy an especially profitable and intellectually serious experience. ### **Trusted Organization for**

**Studying Abroad:** CIEE has 97 study programs in over 30 countries and has teach abroad program in Chile, China, Spain, and Thailand. CIEE has been supporting students and creating programs for 60 years and continues to increase their

offerings. Summer, semester and year-round study abroad programs are in many countries including Morocco, Argentina, Australia, and Jordan.

This summer in Morocco students can study Arabic at any level alongside a course in contemporary Moroccan society and culture. In fall or spring semester program courses are offered on the Koran, modern Moroccan literature, and business and economic issues in the Arab world.

When a student enrolls with CIEE their whole experience is supported by the program. Students may choose to live in a home stay with a local family or in a student residence hall. A three-day orientation is mandatory at the beginning of the program and cultural activities and field trips are included in both study and leisure time.

The fees vary depending on the program chosen; the summer program in Morocco costs \$5,700 for the program fee and estimated \$2,450 in additional costs for transportation and personal expenses. The fall semester program fee is \$13,000 with estimated \$4,050 in additional, individual costs. Tuition includes airport meet and greet, full-time leadership and support, tuition, housing, two meals a day, orientation, cultural activities, pre-departure advising, and a local transportation pass.

### **Resident Camp Counselors**

**Needed:** Positions available at Camp Wright, an Episcopal summer camp located on Kent Island, Maryland.

**Camp Courageous of Iowa is a year-round recreational and respite care facility for individuals with disabilities.** Campers with mental and physical disabilities, brain injuries, hearing or visual

impairments, autism, ADD and other special needs are served.

Working with children and adults with special needs is often a very real challenge. Campers may need help with personal care including feeding, dressing, and personal care.

Some campers exhibit behavior problems. Patience, energy, good judgment and enthusiasm are important qualifications for a position at Camp Courageous. The hours are long. An unselfish attitude and an emphasis on teamwork are needed.

Staff are expected to put the campers' needs before their own. If you possess the necessary attributes, I invite you to apply for a position at Camp Courageous.
