COMPETITION

100 Projects for Peace - St. John's College has received an invitation from Kathryn Wasserman Davis and the Davis United World College Scholars Program for any interested undergraduates on our campus to

design grassroots "Projects for Peace," that will take place in the summer of 2011. This competitive program will award \$10,000 each to the top 100 submissions. The idea is to encourage and support today's motivated youth to create and try out their ideas for peace in the 21st century.

This program is being funded by a \$1 million gift from Kathryn Wasserman Davis, the mother of Shelby M.C. Davis, who funds the Davis United World College Scholars Program. Ms. Kathryn Wasserman Davis who is now 103 years old wants to use this milestone "to help young people launch some immediate initiatives... that could bring new thinking to the prospects for peace in the world." Participation in the program is limited to the 90 American colleges and schools now in the Davis UWC Scholars Program.

To be considered, a student (or group of students) must prepare a two-page written statement which describes the project (who, what, where, how) including expected outcomes and prospects for future impact, as well as a one-page budget. The Davis program has left the definition of "project for peace" extremely vague intentionally. "No clear definition [for projects for peace] is offered so as not to limit imagination. We hope to encourage creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship. The overall program (all 100 projects) is to be worldwide in scope and impact, but specific projects may be undertaken anywhere and as grassroots are desired, including in the U.S."

St. John's College as a college may only put forth one proposal and either one or two alternate proposals. To get started, interested students should see staff in the Career Services Office **as soon as possible**.

*I worked with my college's Career Services Office to get their expertise on **writing effective resumes and cover letters** and learned how to target these documents to the position for which I was applying.*

I began looking for an internship rather early (October-November) because I knew if I waited I would be bogged down by coursework and would probably miss the deadlines.

I deleted some information and pictures on Facebook to ensure that potential employers would not form a bad impression, and I changed my voicemail message to make it sound more professional.

SUMMER INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Internships from the Institute for Humane Studies at George Mason University – assists undergraduate and graduate students interested in individual liberty by awarding nearly \$700,000 in scholarships, sponsoring interns in placements across the country. The following is a selection of their internship offerings.

Joint Program in Survey

Methodology (JPSM) – at the University of Maryland is a federally sponsored consortium of two universities and a private research firm that provides graduate level training in survey methodology. Each summer JPSM sponsors a Junior Fellows Program for a limited number of undergraduate students. Successful applicants are paid research assistantships in a Federal statistical agency in the Washington, DC area. Participants work on key indicators of unemployment, crime, consumer prices, population migration and growth, agricultural production, educational performance of young people, transportation trends, or a host of other topics. A salary of at least \$24,000 (full-time annual equivalent) and dormitory housing will be provided.

The application process opens November 1, 2010 and ends February 1, 2011 at 5pm ET

U.S. Department of State Internship Program

– the U.S. Department of State Internship Program was established to encourage college students to consider careers in a foreign affairs agency and aid the Department in achieving its mission to administer US foreign policy and maintain diplomatic relations throughout the world.

The internship program is highly competitive and the application process starts very early as security clearance alone takes approximately 60-90 days. Open to U.S. citizens, must be a junior, senior or graduate student from an accredited college or university who has completed at least 60 credits and is in good academic standing. Wall Street Journal – offers paid internships with their U.S., Europe, and Asia offices, as well as an art internship. Internships are aimed at undergraduates or recent graduates who intend to pursue a career in journalism.

- 10 interns will be selected
- Prior journalism internships and campus newspaper experience highly recommended

Washington Internship Institute – offers **Capitol Experience, Go Green!** and **Embassy Scholars** summer internships with Washington, DC organizations such as CNN, NPR, the Democratic and Republican national committees, Greenpeace, the Sierra Club, Embassies and the US State Department.

- **Application deadline is March 1st, 2011**

BUT some organizations choose their interns in the early spring, so you should consider applying in December or January if possible. (Applying early is essential if you are interested in high-profile organizations, if you are a journalism student, or if you want to intern in certain government agencies.)



SCHOLARSHIPS, GRANTS, & FELLOWSHIPS

There are a number of scholarships and fellowships available to St. John’s students for both undergraduate and graduate study, both in the U.S. and abroad. Below are descriptions of these opportunities whose deadlines have not passed but that still have **deadlines that occur during Fall semester**. Most of these scholarships and fellowships require nomination by the St. John’s Fellowship Committee and must initially be submitted directly to the Career Services Office.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDY

Goldwater Scholarships – funding for Junior and/or Senior years at St. John’s

- Provides ~up to \$7,500 to be used for tuition, books, fees, and room and board. If awarded for junior year, can be renewed for senior year.
- Must be current sophomore or junior and must be in the *top 1/4* of your class.
- Candidates must have excellent grades in science and math and be committed to careers in science, math, or engineering. Prior research/summer internships in one of these areas are essential for a strong application.
- *Requires nomination by St. John’s Fellowship Committee.*

Nancy Talbot Scholarship Award

– for perseverance and ingenuity; funding for women currently enrolled at St. John's. Applicants must

- Be women currently residing in the United States or Canada
- Be women who have earned a high school diploma or their GED on or before September 2001
- Be enrolled or planning to enroll in a full- or part-time undergraduate course of study
- Be attending the full 2011-12 academic year and receiving a degree no earlier than May 2012
- Have at least two semesters remaining to complete an undergraduate degree as of the beginning of the 2011 fall academic term.

Thorne Premedical Scholarships – funding for summer, pre-medical classes in chemistry

- Applicant must demonstrate financial need and be a recipient of College Financial Aid at St. John's.
- Must have a grade point average acceptable to a medical school -- 3.2 or higher.
- The applicant must be a student from the Santa Fe campus and should be returning to the Santa Fe campus for the year following the award.
- The applicant must be committed to pursuing pre-medical studies leading to a career in allopathic (traditional Western) medicine as

- distinct from the other health sciences.
- The applicant must demonstrate the ability to do hard and good work in the sciences, and demonstrate a high promise of being admitted to medical school.
- Support is offered only for courses **required** for medical school admission. Usually, General Chemistry and Organic Chemistry are supported, and, with lower priority, related biology courses. Tuition, fees, and required summer earnings may also be covered by Thorne awards. In addition, applications to cover books, travel, and living expenses will be considered. Partial support for a year away from St. John's can also be given. Amounts of the actual awards vary greatly, depending on financial needs and on the amount of money available in a given year.

- *Scholarship recipients are selected by the St. John's Pre-Medical Committee.*
- Deadline for submission to the Career Services Office: **December 16th, 2010**. Recipients notified in February, with funds disbursed later in spring semester.



SCHOLARSHIPS FOR UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE STUDY COMBINED

Beinecke Scholarship – open to juniors planning to pursue graduate degrees who meet superior standards of intellectual ability, scholastic achievement and personal promise, and who are currently eligible for financial aid.

- Applicant must be committed to pursuing graduate course of study in the arts, humanities, or social sciences.
- The scholarship provides \$30,000 for graduate study, which may be spread over two-five years.
- Winners also receive \$4,000 immediately prior to entering graduate school to defray costs of application, moving expenses, etc.
- There are no geographic restrictions on the use of the scholarship, and recipients are allowed to supplement the award with other scholarships, assistantships, and research grants.
- *Students must be nominated by the St. John's College Fellowship Committee.*

Truman Scholarships – funding for Senior year at St. John's, plus 2 years of graduate school

- Up to \$30,000 for graduate study in public service fields.
- 60-65 scholarships awarded yearly: normally one scholarship for each state.
- Awarded to current juniors who have outstanding leadership potential and who intend to pursue careers in government, the non-profit sector or public service.
- Applicants must be full-time juniors in the *upper 1/4* of their class.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR GRADUATE STUDY IN THE U.S.

**Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowship for
New Americans** – funding for U.S.
graduate study.

- Applicants must be Holders of Green Cards, naturalized citizens, or a child of at least one naturalized citizen parent
- The fellowship provides \$25,000 maintenance and half tuition (up to a maximum of \$20,000 per academic year)
- Supports 30 individuals per year for up to two years of graduate study in any subject.
- **Application Deadline is November 1st, 2010**

Math for America (MfA) – a private nonprofit organization with a mission to improve math education in U.S. secondary public schools by recruiting, training, and retaining outstanding mathematics teachers.

- Successful applicants demonstrate the following qualities: know and love math, enjoy interacting with young people, possess excellent communication skills, be able to work with students and have ideas on how to create constructive learning environments, taking personal responsibility for themselves and their actions.
- Five-year program for recent college graduates and mid-career professionals.
- The Fellowship includes one year earning a master's degree in education and four years teaching

math and participating in MfA corps activities and professional development.

- Fellows receive a full-tuition scholarship to earn a master's degree or teacher credentialing program in Mathematics Education; receive up to \$100,000 in stipends in addition to a full time teacher's salary and more.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR GRADUATE STUDY ABROAD

American-Scandinavian

Foundation – awards for U.S. citizens for graduate study/research in Scandinavian countries.

- Fellowships of up to \$23,000 offered for year-round study
- Grants of \$5,000 for research or study visits of one to three months
- ASF awards may require supplementation from other sources, but they should not duplicate the benefits of additional awards (and *vice versa*).
- Applicants must have a well-defined project that makes a stay in Scandinavia essential

Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program – offers

grants for U.S. citizen undergraduate students of limited financial means (must be receiving a Federal Pell Grant) to pursue academic studies abroad. Such international study is intended to better prepare U.S.

students to assume significant roles in an increasingly global economy and interdependent world. The program encourages students to choose nontraditional study abroad destinations, especially those outside of Western Europe, Australia, and New Zealand. Over 2,300 scholarships of up to \$5,000 are made for study abroad, with the average award being approximately \$4,000. **Funding will be offered for summer study abroad for the first time in 2011—eligibility requirements are being finalized.**

Boren Fellowships – encourage

U.S. graduate students to add an important international and language component to their educations, and can include language study, research, and academic internships.

- Applicant must be a U.S. citizen enrolled, or applying to enroll, as a degree-seeking graduate student in an accredited U.S. institution
- \$12,000 for a semester abroad, \$24 for a year abroad
- Fellows must complete their programs before graduation
- Most applicants design their own programs in consultation with their academic advisers
- Overseas study must be a minimum of 12 weeks
- Preference is given to applicants proposing overseas programs of 6 months or longer

- Applicants proposing overseas programs of 3-6 months, especially those in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, however, are encouraged to apply
