Hodson Internship Program

The Hodson Internship Program offers students the opportunity to pursue summer internships in virtually any career field, by funding otherwise unpaid positions. Through this program, St. John's undergraduate students can:

- explore potential career directions
- gain experience in their fields of interest
- develop professional skills
- investigate new interests
- inform future career choices

Thanks to a generous grant from the Hodson Trust, the college is able to fund up to twenty-five internships annually.

Students may apply for two types of summer internships:

• **Research internships in the biological, environmental, and medical sciences**

1. Application deadline: **Monday, December 13, 2010 by 4:00 pm.**
2. Application materials are reviewed by a Selection Committee.
3. Interview: Will begin the week of January 10th.
4. Committee decisions are announced late January.

• **Career-related internships in almost any field**

1. Application deadline: **Thursday, March 25, 2010 by 4:00 pm.**
2. Application materials are reviewed by a Selection Committee.
3. Committee decisions are announced on or before May 1st.

Program Overview

- The Career Services Office oversees the program and assists students in finding a position or in formulating a proposal of their own interest.
- Students apply directly to the mentor for the position and to the Hodson Committee for funding.
- A Selection Committee drawn from faculty and staff reviews each application.
- The primary criterion is interest rather than previous academic accomplishment or experience in the field of interest.
- During the selection process, the Committee also considers the overall strength of the application and how well the internship fits the student’s abilities and career goals.
- Eligible students may apply for Hodson funding each year—even if they’ve previously been awarded funding.
- Stipend amounts depend on the type of work and the length of service. Stipends are subject to federal and state taxes.
- Interns act as contractual employees and both students and mentors are required to sign a contract with the terms of the internship outlined and a general release agreement.
- Interns are required to write a follow-up report at completion of the internship.

Eligibility

Students must be enrolled at the Annapolis campus for the academic year immediately preceding the internship. Students are eligible from the summer following their freshman year to the summer immediately following their senior year. Internships are open to undergraduate students regardless of financial need. Students must be in good academic standing. F-1 students will not be eligible for off-campus internships unless they apply to the Bureau of Citizenship & Immigration Services for “optional practical training.”

Application Procedure

To apply, submit the following items to the Career Services Office:

- **Description of the internship:** either a copy of an established internship listing or a proposal on official letterhead outlining an internship opportunity developed by a mentor with whom the student would like to work.
- **Letter of interest:** (e.g., How will the internship benefit you and help you formulate your future career plans? Describe your experience up to the present within the field of interest.)
- **Two recommendations:** at least one from a tutor (forms are available from the Career Services Office)
- **Completed application form**
- **Unofficial (or official) transcript**
- **Resume**

For research internships in the biological, environmental, and medical sciences (Early Decision Internships) students must also be interviewed.

Intern duties and responsibilities vary according to post or office of assignment. Interns may write reports on human rights issues, assist with trade negotiations, assist with citizen's services or visa work, help Americans in distress abroad, or organize conferences or visits of high-level officials. Others may research economic or environmental issues, write news stories, work on web pages or help produce electronic journals.
